Troll Valley is a family-run campground located just a few minutes from Walmart in Farmington (283 Red Schoolhouse Road).

Owner Galen Sayward began the campground in 1999 and introduced disc golf in 2010. The cost is \$5 per person to play and there are group discounts available. For those not familiar with the game, plastic discs are thrown into a series of metal baskets placed throughout an outdoor course with the object being to complete the course using the fewest possible throws. Disc golf is a cheap and fun way to get exercise in the Farmington area, is a great way to get a walk in the woods and can also be played in any season.

There is a snack bar available on the site with candy, sodas,

water and other snacks as well. Troll Valley is open every day of the year and disc golf is open from dusk to dawn. Sayward is hoping to work with Mt. Blue High School to get a regular group from the high school to play disc golf as a club sport in the coming fall.


