

Parsons' brother was vice president of engineering for Clarks shoes so she decided to sell shoes in the back of the store and gifts in the front. The demand for shoes was high as there were not any shoe stores in Farmington. As the store began filling up with shoes, the gift section became smaller.



When Parsons heard about Trask Jewelers downsizing in their downtown Farmington location, she seized the opportunity to rent a second store that sold mainly gifts, linens, table cloths, signs and other primitive home décor items. The business in downtown Farmington has been running for a year now while her store on Front St. has been open for 9 years. By displaying a home scene in the window downtown, Parsons is able to give a preview of what she sells while demonstrating how her merchandise can be used to decorate any home space.

Though she loves coming up with new ideas for how to decorate the window and store, her favorite aspect of her job is building connections with the community and helping people find a new pair of shoes that they are happy with.

"I love meeting the customers and I've gained so many friendships just working with the people of the town and community," says Parsons.


